- ❖ I have taught 4 courses at the DC Prison Scholars Program, organized through Georgetown University: The Philosophy of Friendship; The Philosophy of Promises; Four Moral Vices and Four Works of Shakespeare; and Philosophy and Film, 2018-2020
 - These courses were among the first at the DC Correctional Facility to include both male and female inmates.
 - Though the facility is a jail and not a prison, it holds over 2100 residents (since DC does not have its own prison).
 - In this role, I have provided testimony for numerous commutation and parole hearings.
 - *Educational Volunteers have not been permitted to enter the DC Correctional Facility since the outbreak of COVID-19, nor are we able to meet with students remotely.*
- ❖ I have a short book under review at Princeton University Press. If accepted, it will appear in a series of short works aimed at a public audience. My book is on the topic of Philosophy and the Me Too Movement: *What Philosophy Can Do for the Me Too Movement*
